The Open House conference will be hosted by the new Canberra Glassworks and the Australian National University. These outstanding facilities will welcome a world class list of featured international and Australian speakers along with a diverse selection of exhibitions and post conference workshops. The Open House program promises to be one of the classic Ausglass conferences.

Treasurer's Report - Damian Connellan

Our current financial year is rapidly coming towards its end and the question that confronts every treasurer of a not for profit organisation is will the members renew this year and will we make a surplus for the year. As you would all be aware the membership year finished on the 31st may 2007 and we are well into the new membership year. Many members have renewed and this is very heartening but sadly there are some who have yet to renew and who may shortly be removed from the Ausglass Online Gallery, the members@ausglass email system and our mailing list. Hopefully this will not happen to you.

Will Ausglass make a surplus for the year ended 31 October 2007? Well, barring unforseen eventualities, Ausglass should finish the year in a better financial position than when we started.

The applications for Deductible Gift Recipient status (DGR) and Tax Concession Charity status (TCC) have both been submitted and we expect responses before the end of September. At this stage we are not aware of any reason why Ausglass would not be granted DGR and TCC status. Getting these accreditations is an important step as charitable foundations have indicated that they will not provide funding to organisations such as Ausglass unless they have both DGR and TCC accreditation and at the same time they have indicated that they are interested in providing funding towards visiting artists that are involved in teaching and demonstrations. So we are keeping our fingers crossed that the approvals will come through in time for grant applications for the Open House Conference.

2007 RANAMOK GLASS PRIZE AWARDED TO EVELYN DUNSTAN

Last weekend the new Canberra Glassworks was thrilled to host the opening of the 2007 Ranamok Glass Prize. The 2007 Ranamok Glass Prize has been awarded to Evelyn Dunstan for her entry, *Ngahere Karauna (Forest Crown)*. The work is an intricate, upright structure springing alive with tendrils, leaves and blooms to symbolise movement and growth. The tangle of pale but luminous green casts an equally detailed shadow. Ms Dunstan, who conceded she was very much caught up in the atmosphere at the Glassworks, stated -

"I was on cloud nine just with being here; I was content with the honour of being accepted into Ranamok, and with my piece arriving safely! I did Sharon's course at the glassworks during the day and then met so many fantastic artists! I was buzzing, and certainly did not expect to win – it's been surreal!"

Artists Comments:

The native Clematis climbs to the top of the forest to display its crowning beauty, supported by and dependant on the strength and survival of the fauna below.

The crown of the forest or a vase made of flowers? With the major structure gone the entwining network becomes the strength. Change and adjustments in nature and human nature.



The Award was announced on August 25 at the exhibition's opening at the Canberra Glassworks, where the exhibition will remain on display until 23 September.

With crowds of nearly 250 gathering to hear Ranamok founders, Maureen Cahill and Andrew Plummer, announce this years' winner, the atmosphere in the once derelict industrial space was alive with anticipation.

A dynamic survey of contemporary studio glass, the exhibition spans the Glassworks' two gallery spaces and several pieces rest at eye level in the foyer, where the evenings' formalities took place.

After the Canberra Glassworks, the exhibition will travel to Sydney as part of the City of Sydney's Art & About Festival. In Sydney, it will be on display in the foyer of Angel Place Office Tower at 123 Pitt Street from October 2 - 21. In November, the exhibition will travel to Brisbane where it will be exhibited at Queensland Parliament House. From there, the exhibition will tour to regional galleries in Queensland and NSW.

So... you can expect your State Rep. to ask you to participate in supplying contact details for suppliers of materials you have sourced. They will be contacted and asked if they are happy to be included in the Directory and also if they would be interested in advertising.

VICKI TORR ONLINE GALLERY PRIZE

The Vicki Torr Online Gallery Prize will be held again this year and announced at our Conference in Canberra in January.

The Prize of will be awarded by Ausglass to an emerging artist whose work has been included on Ausglass' Online Gallery and which is judged by Ausglass Members to be the best in that year.

The purpose for the prize is to encourage emerging artists to increase their public profile by placing their one page curriculum vitae and photographic examples of their work on the Ausglass Online Gallery. The secondary purpose of the prize is to increase the numbers of contemporary glass artists displaying their work on the Ausglass Online Gallery and therefore randomly appearing on the Ausglass Homepage. The practical experience of some of those already on the gallery indicates that there is an increased likelihood of Australian and Overseas Galleries and collectors using the Ausglass site as a means of keeping abreast of glass art in Australia and benefiting all glass artists not just emerging artists.

Eligibility

To be eligible to win the prize:

- A person must have placed photographic examples of their work and their one page curriculum vitae on the Ausglass Online Gallery by November 30;
- A person must be an emerging artist;
- Family members may have two separate entries on the Online Gallery;
- Winners of the Vicki Torr Online Gallery prize in one year will not be eligible to enter the competition in subsequent years.

Eligible participants will enhance their chances of winning the prize if they ensure that the quality of photography is high. The curriculum vitae should not exceed one A4 size page and should accurately reflect the achievements of the emerging artist.

Voting will commence in December. I encourage all emerging artists to participate.

Vale John Williams – Craftek Kilns

Our dear friend John Williams passed away 30th May after a long illness. John was born 10th March 1953. His funeral in his home town of Wangaratta was filled to over flowing with family and friends. We were regaled with stories of a busy life, spent travelling and unselfishly solving others technical problems here and in countries around the world. He had a large circle of admirers and there were many tales of late nights helping with firing those recalcitrant kilns.

As I said in the brief email at the time, I will greatly miss his laconic attitude to life. After graduating engineering at Monash University, he setup a kiln manufacturing company, Soleil Services and subsequently Craftek. We worked on many projects together as he did with most suppliers to the glass and ceramic industries. He was extensively involved with the slumping and hot glass people and it is likely that his kilns are helping you now.

I did not see him often enough in the last year but do fondly recall the hours visiting him at his refuge at Milawa with his beloved shed, motorbike, trees and coffee."

IX. INTERNATIONAL GLASS SYMPOSIUM NOVY BOR, CZECH REPUBLIC, EUROPE – Zoja Trofimiuk

During October 2006, I attended an International Glass Symposium in the northern part of the Czech Republic in a beautiful town, with a long tradition in glass making, called *Novy Bor*. The Symposium was organised by *Crystalex* with the participating artists from all over the world being chosen and invited by the curator, *Prof., PhD. Sylva Petrova*; an internationally renowned expert in studio glass, who is currently lecturing at Southerland University in the United Kingdom.

The group of thirty artists* chosen from around the world who attended the symposium was diverse, especially in terms of style, attitude, age, professional recognition and originality. The resulting work was very interesting and, in my opinion, challenging for all of us. Surprisingly, there were no similar pieces or ideas, and credit should be given to *Prof. Petrova's* curatorial expertise and capacity of vision for being able to organize such an interesting and diverse group. For four days in October, we had unlimited access to the *Crystalex* complex. This included:


• the factory with furnaces;

• Cold glass studios equipped with sandblasters, diamond wheels, diamond saws, engraving drills and painting facilities;

• Internet access from the Crystalex offices; and

• The factory canteen, with lunches provided. In addition, every artist had a personal interpreter assigned to and artisans from various departments were also assigned to work on our pieces. The material we used – *Crystalex's* glass – has a high lead content, and this gives the glass a very crisp, icy look and it reflects light very sharply.

I arrived at *Novy Bor* two weeks prior to the beginning of the Symposium. I had brought a wax



model and after consultation with the master blowers, agreed on the necessary modifications. The *Novy Bor College of Glass* (equivalent of High School in Australia) then made a plaster mould for glass to be blown into. The College and *Crystalex* ensured that the mould was dry and ready in time for the Symposium.

We were permitted to work in the hot glass factory from 6 am until 2 pm, and in the afternoon, we were able to work in the cold glass studios until 6 pm. All of the factory employees were skilled professionals and it was pleasure to watch them work. My role consisted of organizing and synchronizing all these professionals so that they could realise my vision. The experience of being able to see such skilled people at work and learning from them was amazing.

When all of the work was completed and ready for the exhibition, we had the opportunity to socialise. The reception was held at the four-star *Parkhotel*. There were waiters in white gloves who served chilled champagne in crystal engraved glasses. There were speeches, beautiful bouquets and photographers recording the event for the TV and a number of magazines.

We were given an excellent folder, with information about all the participating artists – in both Czech and English – as a farewell gift. We were also presented with a set of glasses that had won a design award in 2005; these were designed by a Czech designer, *Prof Pelcl.* From a graphic point of view, all of the material used for promoting the event was brilliantly designed; for example, the main image which had been used on the poster and on billboards was repeated throughout all the promotional material. *Novy Bor* is an inspiring venue for art lovers. One is surrounded by Gothic, Baroque, 19th Century Classicism and Art Noveau architecture. The town is pleasant, safe and it seems like everybody is aware of everyone else. In the early mornings, when we were walking down the main streets, we could hear the muffled noise from glass furnaces. The majority of the locals are involved in the glass industry. There are small glass blowing studios, engraver's workshops or glass painting studios on just about every corner. There are two well-equipped glass stores, where it is possible to buy or order tools or material. **O**verall, the Symposium was excellently organized; it had lived up to its reputation and the artworks which were created there were interesting. They remain part of the Contemporary Glass Collection and are permanently on display in nearby *Lemberk Chateaux*, along with works from previous gatherings.

I was fortunate to have had the opportunity to see how it is possible to accommodate a group of artists without jeopardizing the production schedule of the company. My only regret is that it would have been nice to have had more time to try other glass techniques whilst at *Crystalex* and to have had more time at our disposal to converse with other artists about their work.

LIVING TREASURES 2008

CRAFT AUSTRALIA wishes to draw your attention to a recent accolade for Australian glass artist Brian Hirst. Object Galleries recently announced the recipients of the 2008-2010 Living Treasures awards – Liz Williamson (2008), Kevin Perkins (2009) and Robert Baines (2010). Brian was one of the short-listed finalists for Living Treasures.

The *Living Treasures* series recognizes talented senior crafts practitioners that have been influential in the Australian cultural sector. In this second Living Treasures series, Object and Craft Australia have enhanced the program by celebrating the short listed finalists in the selection process as Masters of Australian craft. This new development acknowledges the wealth and dynamism of the Australian studio craft movement of the past thirty years. Ten finalists were short listed by the judges. These Masters of Australian craft are Robert Baines (Vic), Pippin Drysdale (WA), Beth Hatton (NSW), Brian Hirst (NSW), Jeff Mincham (SA), Milton Moon (SA), Kevin Perkins (Tas), Catherine Truman (SA), Margaret West (NSW), Liz Williamson (NSW).

Craft Australia is concurrently developing a permanent reference resource on its website to promote Australia's outstanding, senior craft anddesign practitioners.

The site will acknowledge these senior artists as LIVING TREASURES: MASTERS OF AUSTRALIAN CRAFT. LUCENT: A SURVEY OF CONTEMPORARY CANADIAN GLASS – Katherine Lys

2007 is the Year of Craft in Canada and a range of events are happening across the country showcasing all craft mediums. CODA, Craft Organization Development Association, chose to bring it's yearly conference to Calgary, Alberta, making it the first CODA conference to be held outside of the USA. To be run in conjunction with this, artists came forward to plan the Invisible Visible Craft Symposium (June 10 - 12). This symposium was an opportunity for local craft artists to get together, see each other's work, attend guest lectures (Peter Powning was the keynote speaker), participate in panel discussions, watch demonstrations and take workshops.

For a long time it has been a goal of GAAC, the Glass Art Association of Canada, to put together a national juried show, and while so many key figures in the craft community would be in town for these events, it was an opportunity not to be missed. So for the first time in Calgary, and in Canada, there would be a juried exhibition of contemporary Canadian glasswork. The exhibition was juried by internationally renowned glass artist: Carole Pilon, head of ACAD's glass department: Norm Faulkner and curator of Modern Glass at the Corning Museum: Tina Oldknow.

The show was put together over a six month period by local glass artists Chris Boha, Jamie Gray and myself, as well as co-president of GAAC, Julia Reimer. The call for entry was put out to glass artists of all stages in their careers and had an overwhelming response of over 300 pieces submitted from across the country. 67 of these pieces were selected, including flameworked, cast, blown, sculpted, coldworked glass and mixed media.
