Welcome to the first Ausglass newsletter for 2006. As you would be aware, Ausglass held its AGM in March at which new office bearers were elected. Standing down were Janeen Toner (President), Laurie Young (Vice-President) and Emma Borland.

Janeen has been a long-standing member of the Board and President for thee years and we are indebted to her for such a large contribution to our organization. On behalf of all members, I thank Janeen for all the effort she has put in over that period. Many thanks also to Laurie Young, who held the position of Victorian state representative prior to her joining the Board, serving as Vice-President, and Emma Borland.

The new board members are Julie Parker (ACT), Anne Clifton (WA), James Dodson (Tas), Simon James (NSW) and myself. Ruth McCallum-Howell remains on the board as Secretary and Damian Connellan as Treasurer together with George Aslanis and Beth Newman. It is pleasing to see most of the Australian States are now represented.

The new Board is still in its infancy however we are aware of the lack of a newsletter recently and it is therefore our first concern. Our aim is to publish four newsletters a year in May, August, November and February. Please do not hesitate to make your contribution and voice your joys or concerns through the newsletter or via email. We are planning for new and different ways of disseminating information. To assist in this we are also automatically placing all members on Ausglass2 and making it the platform for sending out newsletter and other electronic bulletins. Members can then choose to not receive this information rather than have to sign up.

Congratulations and thanks to Pauline North and her team for organising the most successful Flair exhibition in WA. This has been a huge success at both an advocacy & financial level and we are most grateful for all the work this entails.

We are exploring the idea of an annual on-line gallery prize for emerging artists. We hope this will be in the form of a cash prize voted for by the members in the same vein as the Vicki Torr prize.

An on-line forum has been developed by Arthur Sale and we are in the final stages of identifying moderators and once these issues are resolved, the forum will become active and we encourage you to use it. This forum will be open to all interested parties to encourage information exchange including technical information and debate.

The most exiting news is that the Annual Conference in 2008 will be held at the new Glassworks in Canberra. Planning is already underway. If you are interested in participating please do not hesitate to contact us at admin@auslgass.org.au. This conference is out of time from the normal biennial conference due to the GAS Conference and the fact that the Glassworks will not be finished until late 2007.

Our major annual Board meeting is currently planned for July where Board members will gather in Melbourne. One of the major items on the agenda will be strategic planning for the organization for the next five years. This is important to retain focus and assist planning. We strongly encourage all members to let their State Representative know what issues or events should be dealt with at this meeting so that their representative can formulate some input to this important meeting.

I feel very passionate about Ausglass & look forward to an exciting two years.

Treasurer's Report

Most of you will have recognised from last year's annual report sent out in February of this year that it was a year of considerable progress towards rebuilding the financial standing of Ausglass and setting it up so that Ausglass can move forward with some confidence towards the next conference in 2008.

Since the start of the new financial year on 1 November 2005 progress has been steady but slow as we have been transitioning the member renewal date to 31 May each year. This transition has now been largely completed and I am about to bill everyone for next year's membership through to 31 May 2007.

The change to a common renewal date will enable Ausglass to streamline its administration processes reducing administrative time significantly. But, significantly, it will also mean that Ausglass will be able to ascertain within a few months of 31 May each year the funds it has available to provide services to its members and this:

- Will enable State Representative funding requirements to be catered for (something that was not able to happen properly until now as we did not know who was going to renew and who was not);
- Will enable Ausglass to specifically budget its other activities, in particular the amount it spends on its website and electronic communications;
- Will enable Ausglass to better control who receives information through the Ausglass2 email bulletin (i.e. if you are not paid up you will not be placed on the Ausglass2 e-mail list);

- Will enable Ausglass to more easily ensure that only paid up members are included on the online gallery; and
- Will enable the new Ausglass E-newsletter and other electronic bulletins to be sent specifically to current members of Ausglass.

You will note that an outcome of this initiative is a focus on electronic communication, rather than the slower and costlier snail mail approach used in the past, and this is another important reason why you should keep Ausglass advised of your current e-mail address. The relevant e-mail address that you should send changes of contact details to is treasurer@ausglass.org.au.

We are also moving to sending out this year's annual report via e-mail so I encourage those 20-30 members who have not supplied us with an e-mail address to do so.

Western Australia recently held the Flair 2006 exhibition and Pauline North and the other organisers are to be congratulated as the exhibition has obviously established a good reputation for itself as sales exceeded \$15,000 this year and this has enabled Flair 2006 to generate a surplus of just over \$5,000. No doubt the West Australian team are pleased and satisfied that all their good work has paid off and it will make the organisation of a future Flair exhibition easier and more likely to be successful as well. From a financial perspective the success of Flair 06 has contributed significantly to the year to date surplus of just over \$8,000 and will assist Ausglass in increasing its investment in electronic communications. That's all for now, I look forward to talking to you in the next newsletter and thank Simon James for taking on the responsibility of looking after Ausglass' newsletter and electronic bulletins.

We are all excited to be a part of a large public art-work, which will reinterpret the former smoke-stack, and sit on the remnant smokestack base.

The lucky students at the ANU School of Art Glass Workshop have had the De la Torre brothers, Einar and Jamex- the mad Mexicans of hot glass, in residence during semester one. They worked on a collaborative project with Slim, a Naive/Outsider artist. It's not often you see a bloke in the hotshop

wearing a three-piece suit and a cowboy hat! The students also had an intensive, 3-week residency with Ted Sawyer, Director of Research and Education at Bullseye. Ted's visit reinforces the strong connection between the school and Bullseye.

We were treated to a visit in April from a Tiwi Island glass artist, Jock Puautjimi and his wife Edna, who came down to Canberra to work with Luna Ryan at her ANCA studio. Luna has visited the Tiwi islands to work with artists up there several times. Poor Jock was feeling the cold...I don't blame him, this will be my third Canberra winter, and I still can't get used to it!

TAS - James Dodson

Scratch the surface in Tassie and we have a small but enthusiastic lot who are passionate about glass across all the disciplines: from restoration of the earliest Australian hand painted stained glass windows to contemporary work and including the establishment of a new gallery dedicated solely to Tasmanian glass.

Arts Tasmania's funding arm — Arts@Work, have funded several arts in public buildings, recently including Merinda Young's panel in the visitor's reception building in the new Risdon Prison. Workshop junkie that she is, Merinda is off shortly to Pilchuck!

Bob Bird was awarded the commission to develop four panels of kiln formed glass for the foyer of the East Launceston Primary School redevelopment.

Another funded project has been the creation of a panel incorporating digi glass as part of the restoration of the Peacock building at the Repatriation Hospital in Hobart.

Gavin Merrington is involved in a range of both restoration and contemporary glass projects including the Ashwin and Fawkner window painted by John Reidicki in 1881. It is believed to be one of the first significant windows painted in Australia. He also has completed a ten panel window for St. Mary's College.

Rebecca Coote and James Dodson are currently involved in the CAST exhibition "Making Relations" (curated by Suzie Attwill of RMIT). Rebecca has also been selected to be involved in the Design Island's recent traveling exhibition for emerging artists.

Anne Dunham has been actively involved in glass arts and the teaching of the craft within the North West of our state and has been instrumental in establishing glass courses within the arts curriculum at all levels of education. She has also exhibited her glass/metal/wood sculptures throughout the region.

Marilyn Raw has also been doing the workshop circuit in Melbourne with Peter Minson and Catharine Newell in Adelaide.

Grant Medwin is also an incredibly active glass creator, working in the mediums of fusing and slumped glass. Along with his usual creations of dichroic and floral plunge beads, he has also recently been busy creating hundreds of designer plates for the Doherty Hotel group.

Julian Bamping (a practicing glass sculptor and teacher) opened his gallery (GalleryB) in Deloraine late last year. This is the first and only gallery solely devoted to Tasmanian-made glassware. Currently showcasing 17 glass artists it is proving an ideal podium for both established and emerging "glassies".

The Ian Potter Cultural Trust was established by The Ian Potter Foundation in 1993. The Trustees of the Cultural Trust are the same as the Board of Governors as the Foundation.

Cultural Trust grants assist people to undertake a program of international study, or another form of career development (usually overseas). The vast majority of applicants seek funding for overseas travel costs, however a small number of grants are made for the acquisition of specialist musical instruments or non-standard equipment. (Standard equipment such as computer hardware and software, digital cameras, instruments, etc. will not be considered for funding)

The Trust supports postgraduate, not undergraduate study; and applications to travel or to undertake projects or formal courses of study within Australia will not usually be funded.

Please note that Cultural Trust grants are intended for early career practitioners, not those undertaking academic research in the arts and related areas.

We receive many more applications than we are able to support, and approximately one in three applications results in a grant.

The Board in consultation with Declan Somerville is pleased to announce an annual prize, to be funded from the Vicki Torr Fund, for students and emerging glass artists. The prize will be called the Ausglass Vicki Torr On-Line Gallery Prize.

Constitution

The Ausglass Board has commenced a process of reviewing the Ausglass Constitution & Articles of Association. The purpose of the review is to ensure that Ausglass' constitution documents properly reflect the requirements of its members, to ensure that they are in compliance with the Corporations Law as it currently stands and to ensure that Ausglass is able to comply with the requirements for Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status.

The issue of DGR status is becoming increasingly important for not for profit organisations, such as Ausglass, because many foundations, corporations and other bodies that provide financial support are increasingly using DGR status to determine whether or not they provide such support. For example, the Board is aware of organisations that will provide financial assistance for bringing in overseas speakers but will not provide such support to an organisation that does not have DGR status.

Part of this review process includes reviewing the objectives of Ausglass to ensure that they are still relevant. The objectives as set out in clause 1 of the constitution are as follows:

"The objectives for which the Association is established are:

- to convene a National Conference;
- to disseminate information to its members through various forms of electronic or printed material;
- to hold an auction at each National Conference for the purpose of providing funds for the administration of the Association and for the purpose of paying up to one half of the proceeds to the Vicki Torr Memorial Fund, a separately existing charitable fund set up to fund a prize for excellence in glass art making, as a result of a competition to be held at each National Conference."

We request that members give consideration as to what they now expect Ausglass' objectives should be and consider whether any of them should be changed or expanded or, indeed, whether new objectives should be added.
